

## Putin agrees to Temporary halt on Ukraine Energy Strikes following Talks with Trump

In a high-stakes phone conversation, Russian President Vladimir Putin agreed to a 30-day pause in attacks on Ukraine's energy infrastructure following discussions with former U.S. President Donald Trump. The agreement, however, does not extend to a broader ceasefire, as Putin conditioned any further commitments on the cessation of Western military aid to Ukraine.

According to reports, Trump and Putin discussed the ongoing conflict, with the Russian leader expressing openness to further negotiations. The Kremlin confirmed the temporary suspension of strikes on Ukraine's power grid but stressed that broader peace talks would require significant concessions from Kyiv and its allies.

While some analysts view this pause as a potential step toward de-escalation, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy remains skeptical. He warned that Russian forces continue to launch missile and drone attacks on civilian infrastructure despite Moscow's latest pledge. Zelenskyy has called on Western allies to maintain military and financial support, arguing that any reduction in aid would embolden Russia to press for more territorial gains.

Global reactions to the announcement have been mixed. The United States and European nations cautiously welcomed the development but reiterated their commitment to supporting Ukraine. NATO officials have expressed concerns that the temporary pause may serve as a strategic move by Russia to regroup its forces. Meanwhile, the United Nations has urged all parties to use this window for meaningful peace negotiations.

Despite the 30-day agreement, tensions remain high, and the road to a lasting resolution appears uncertain. As diplomatic efforts continue, the world watches closely to see whether this temporary halt in hostilities will lead to broader peace talks or simply serve as a brief respite in the

ongoing war.
