

## Pope Francis to appear publicly for first time in five weeks

VATICAN CITY, March 22 — Pope Francis is set to make his first public appearance in five weeks on Sunday after being hospitalized for double pneumonia. The 88-year-old pontiff will greet well-wishers from Rome's Gemelli Hospital following the Angelus prayer, marking the 38th day of his hospitalization.

While he no longer needs assisted breathing, he continues to receive oxygen.

In his time in hospital, Pope Francis has also approved a significant three-year reform plan for the Catholic Church, focusing on empowering women and increasing the involvement of non-clergy in decision-making. While his recovery continues, the Vatican has not confirmed when he will be discharged, leaving uncertainty about his participation in upcoming Holy Week and Easter service
