

Reform UK Eyes Local Wins to Shift Politics



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Reform UK, the political movement founded by Brexit champion Nigel Farage, is mounting a determined push in the UK's upcoming local elections, seeking to capitalize on public dissatisfaction with mainstream parties. Positioning itself as the voice of disillusioned voters, Reform UK has sharpened its campaign rhetoric on immigration, economic mismanagement, and what it calls the "Westminster disconnect." While previously seen as a fringe protest party, recent polling and grassroots enthusiasm suggest it could gain ground in key councils. As ballots approach, the party is banking on anti-establishment sentiment to boost its presence at the local level and send a broader message to Westminster.
