

Zelenskyy ready for Putin talks in Turkey if ceasefire achieved

In a renewed push for diplomatic resolution, European foreign ministers have urged for immediate peace in Ukraine, emphasizing dialogue as the only path forward. The call for deescalation comes amid rising tensions and mounting international pressure for a ceasefire to halt the ongoing conflict.

Vladimir Putin for peace talks in Turkey, contingent on a mutually agreed ceasefire. Zelenskyy emphasized that open dialogue is essential for ending the conflict and restoring stability to the region. "We are prepared to sit at the table if the guns fall silent," he stated, signaling a significant step towards potential reconciliation.

European Union foreign policy chief Josep Borrell echoed the sentiment, highlighting the critical role of diplomacy in defusing tensions. "A sustainable peace in Ukraine requires dialogue, compromise, and international cooperation," Borrell said, urging both sides to prioritize humanitarian concerns and the safety of civilians.

The Turkish government has welcomed the prospect of hosting the negotiations, positioning itself as a neutral mediator committed to regional stability. Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan affirmed that Ankara is ready to facilitate talks, emphasizing the urgency of finding a peaceful solution.

Analysts believe that a meeting between Zelenskyy and Putin could mark a turning point in the conflict if both parties commit to transparent dialogue and concrete steps towards peace. However, skepticism remains, with some experts cautioning that without firm guarantees, the road to resolution may remain uncertain.

The coming weeks are expected to reveal whether diplomatic overtures will lead to meaningful

progress or further stalemate. Global leaders are watching closely, hopeful that dialogue can

succeed where conflict has failed.
