

US Vice President Vance Heads to Pakistan for Iran Talks



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WASHINGTON / ISLAMABAD: US Vice President JD Vance is expected to travel to Pakistan today, leading a senior American delegation for anticipated diplomatic discussions aimed at addressing escalating tensions with Iran and exploring the possibility of renewed peace negotiations, according to multiple international media reports and officials familiar with the planning.

The proposed talks come at a critical moment as the fragile ceasefire framework between the United States and Iran faces mounting pressure, with uncertainty surrounding Iran's final decision on participation. Reports indicate that while Washington is preparing for the second round of high-level engagement in Islamabad, Tehran has not yet confirmed its attendance.

US President Donald Trump has warned that military hostilities could resume if diplomatic efforts fail to produce an agreement, while also expressing cautious optimism that Iran may still return to the negotiating table despite ongoing disagreements over core issues.

Tensions have further increased following the recent seizure of an Iranian cargo vessel by US naval forces, an incident strongly condemned by Iran's Foreign Ministry, which has demanded the immediate release of the ship and its crew and warned of possible retaliatory steps.

Pakistan is expected to play a key facilitative and hosting role in supporting the diplomatic process, as regional and global stakeholders closely monitor developments that could significantly influence Middle East stability.

While several international outlets including Reuters, The Guardian, Axios, and Associated Press have reported on preparations for the talks, officials caution that final confirmation of Iran's participation remains uncertain.

Further updates are expected as delegations arrive in Islamabad and consultations progress.
