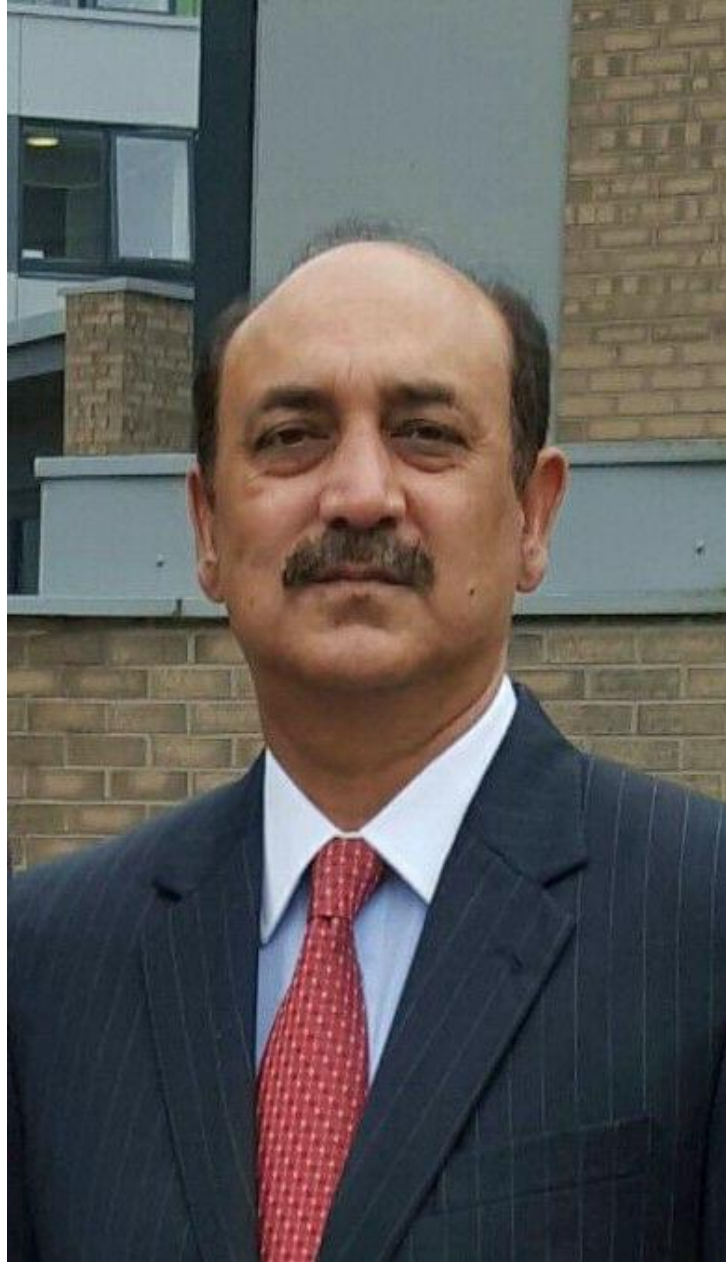


## Every Cloud Has a Silver Lining
